Harm Boukema is Lecturer in the history of modern and contemporary philosophy at Radboud University, Nijmegen (Netherlands). Being mainly concerned with an attempt to construe the history of contemporary thought from a perspective beyond the conflict between analytical and continental philosophy, he is preparing a book on the challengeable presuppositions shared by Frege and Husserl in their conflicting views of the foundations of arithmetic and the nature of numbers. On Russell, he recently published “Towards a Re-Evaluation of ‘On Denoting’” (*Teorema*, 2005) and “Russell en Wittgenstein: Vriendschap in onenigheid” (www.harmboukema.nl/work.htm).

Arkadiusz Chrudzinski, is Research Assistant at the University of Salzburg and Associate Professor of Philosophy at the University of Stettin (Poland); since 2007 he is co-editor of the new edition of Franz Brentano’s works, *Sämtliche veröffentlichte Schriften* (Ontos-Verlag). His current research concerns ontology, epistemology, theory of intentionality, Austrian, German and Polish philosophy, especially Brentano, Meinong, Ingarden, and Husserl; among his published books are *Die Erkenntnistheorie von Roman Ingarden* (1999), *Intentionalitätstheorie beim frühen Brentano* (2001), *Die Ontologie Franz Brentanos* (2004), *Intentionalität, Zeitbewusstsein und Intersubjektivität* (2005) and *Gegenstandstheorie und Theorie der Intentionalität bei Alexius Meinong* (2007).

Sébastien Gandon, Maître de Conférences in the Department of Philosophy, Université Blaise Pascal, Clermont-Ferrand (France), is the author of *Logique et Langage: Études sur le premier Wittgenstein* (2002). He is currently working on the mathematical background of Russell’s logicism. A paper on this topic, entitled “Which Arithmetization for Which Logicism? Russell on Quantities and Relations”, is forthcoming in *History and Philosophy of Logic*.

Raymond Perkins, Jr., Professor and Chair of Philosophy, Plymouth State University, is the editor of *Yours Faithfully, Bertrand Russell* (2002), author of *The ABCs of the Soviet-American Nuclear Arms Race* (1991), and author of a forthcoming book for Continuum, *Bertrand Russell: a Guide for the Perplexed*. He is Vice-President of the Bertrand Russell Society.

Adriana Silva Graça is Professor of Philosophy in the University of Lisbon, where she has taught since 1988. She is mainly interested in the philosophy of language. She was a visiting student in the University of Oxford and is currently a visiting scholar at UCLA. Her PHD thesis from the University of Lisbon was

published by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation as *Reference and Denotation: an Essay on the Sense and the Reference of Names and Descriptions*. She coordinates a research project in the Philosophy Centre of her university, “Project on Content”, within which she develops her own research in the philosophy of language, focused on the semantics for indexical terms, the distinction between semantics and pragmatics, and how to account for “empty names”, among many other issues in the area. Dr. Silva Graça has introduced Russell’s *Introduction to Mathematical Philosophy* in her recent translation of that work into Portuguese.

Hartley Slater is Honorary Senior Research Fellow in Philosophy at the University of Western Australia. His major interests lie in philosophical logic. Recent publications include “A Poor Concept Script” (2004), “Choice and Logic” (2005), “Grammar and Sets” (2006), “Epsilon Calculi” (2006), “Frege’s Hidden Assumption” (2006) and “The Central Error in the *Tractatus*” (2007). Forthcoming are “Logic and Grammar” and a fifth book, *The De-Mathematization of Logic*.

Alberto Voltolini is Associate Professor in Philosophy of Language at the Department of Social, Quantitative and Cognitive Sciences, University of Modena and Reggio Emilia (Italy). His recent publications in English include “How to Get Intentionality by Language?” (2005), “Are There (Nonexistent) Intentionalia?” (2006), “Fiction as a Base of Interpretation Contexts” (2006), “Being, Existence, and Having Instances” (2006), and especially “How Ficta Follow Fiction; a Syncretistic Account of Fictional Entities” (2006). His forthcoming publications include “How to Get a Non-intensionalist, Propositional, Moderately Realist Truthconditional Account of Internal Metafictional Sentences”, “Is Pretence Really Non-Metarepresentational?” with C. Meini, and “Depiction: Fake Perception or Perception of Fake Objects?”.

Russell Wahl is Professor of Philosophy at Idaho State University. He has published various articles on the history of analytic philosophy, including “Impossible Propositions and the Forms of Objects in Wittgenstein’s *Tractatus*” (1995), “Russell’s Theory of Meaning and Denotation and ‘On Denoting’” (1993), “Bertrand Russell’s Theory of Judgment” (1986) and “Knowledge by Description” (1984). He reviews French works in Russell studies for *Russell*.

Paul Weingartner is Professor Emeritus at the University of Salzburg and Chairman of the Institut für Wissenschaftstheorie (Philosophy of Science) at the International Research Centre Salzburg. Research: philosophy of science, logic, metaphysics and philosophy of religion with the help of modern logic. His recent publications include *Evil* (2003), *Alternative Logics: Do Sciences Need Them?* (2004) and, together with P. Mittelstaedt, *Laus of Nature* (2005). His memberships include the New York Academy of Sciences, Academie Internationale de philosophie des sciences and the Association of Symbolic Logic.
